BUSINESS MANAGER'S REPORT

Brothers and Sisters:

Well it's not very often you will hear me boast about one of my accomplishments, but here is one that I am very proud of. It has taken me the better part of a decade and a half to accomplish. Last week, I finally gave my 10th gallon of blood for the American Red Cross. I know we have members and retirees that have given more than that, but I'm the one writing this article. Let me put in perspective what 10 gallons amounts to. Grab 2 – 5 gallon pails and fill them with water and then lift one pail in each hand. Get my point? 10 gallons is equal to 80 pints. That means I've had 80 finger pricks, 80 needles (and probably more) stuck in my arm, 80 trips to the Blood Drives. It all takes time and effort. The only reason I'm writing this article is to hopefully get more people involved and interested in giving blood.

Here are some facts from the American Red Cross:

- 1 donation can potentially save up to 3 lives. That means I possibly could have helped 240 of the Local's members or retirees.
- Every 2 seconds, someone in the U.S. needs blood. It is essential for surgeries, cancer treatment, chronic illnesses, and traumatic injuries. Are you, your family members, or friends, someone who benefitted from a blood donation?
- Less than 38% of the population is eligible to give blood or platelets. I don't like those odds.
- Approximately 36,000 units of red blood cells are needed every day in the U.S.
- Nearly 7,000 units of platelets and 10,000 units of plasma are needed daily in the U.S.
- Nearly 21 million blood components are transfused each year in the U.S.
- The average red cell transfusion is 3 units.
- 1.7 million people are expected to be diagnosed with cancer. Many of them will need blood, sometimes daily, during their Chemotherapy treatment.

- A single car accident victim can require as many as 100 pints of blood.
- 13.6 million whole blood and red blood cells are collected in the U.S. in a year.

There seems to be a great demand for blood donations going on. I see where donation sites are opening up more frequently, along with blood drives. Natural disasters are occurring more often and usually means blood supplies run low. Not everyone can donate blood. About 40 years ago, I tried giving blood about 3 or 4 times and didn't do very well in the process. But I did try again many years later and I am still giving. Things change and technology changes. Many people have tried years ago and couldn't donate blood, maybe things have changed for you as well. If you haven't ever tried, please give it a chance. Believe me you will feel proud and happy when you are done. I know that if I ever need a blood transfusion, I will be grateful that somebody else cared enough to donate.

CODE QUESTION OF THE MONTH

An owner of a commercial property purchased a "Water Bottle Filling Station". He contacted an electrical contractor to have power installed to the unit. The journeyman and apprentice who came to the site began installing power to the unit using a common 20 amp – 125 volt – 3 wire receptacle. The apprentice asked, "Should this outlet be a GFCI style/type receptacle?"

Both electricians went to research NEC Article 422.5 Ground-Fault Circuit Interrupter (GFCI) Protection for Personnel and Article 422.5(A) General. These articles revealed that "Water Bottle Filling Stations" were not listed, therefore GFCI protection is not required. They also checked in SPS316.110 entitled – Examination, Identification, Installation, Use, and Listing Equipment. The manufacturer's instructions stated it did not require GFCI protection.

Therefore, installing 20 amp – 125 volt – 3 wire receptacle is a legal installation.



PAC ARTICLE

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Our Local PAC meeting was held Tuesday, September 17th. We voted on money for the Manitowoc County Democratic Party toward renting their headquarters for the upcoming election season. Don spoke on attending the Governor's Circle event. We discussed Tony Evers seeking to up the Minimum Wage, reinstate Prevailing Wage and challenge the Right to Work (for less) laws. We also talked about the upcoming Spring Primary and General Elections.



Noel Hansen and his wife Jeanie and I attended the Manitowoc County Democratic Party picnic at Lincoln Park in Manitowoc. We presented the check to

the Co-chairs of the party, Ron Kossik and Sherrie Richards. The Key speakers were, Judge Lisa Neubauer, running for Chief Judge of the Wisconsin Court of Appeals, Wisconsin State Treasurer, Sarah Godlewski and Matt Boor, running against Glenn Grothman for the 6th Congressional District.



The race for the 6th Congressional District will be decided in the August 11th, 2020 Primary and Fall General Election November 3rd, 2020.

The USDA invested \$152 million to improve Broadband in 14 states, including Wisconsin. Matt Boor, running against Grothman is employed by a broadband company and he is aboard on expanding broadband in our state.

Governor Evers is trying to reform election laws to be compliant with the Federal laws on overseas absentee voting. The law requires the Wisconsin Election Committee to reimburse counties and municipalities for certain costs incurred in the administration of special primaries and elections for state or national office.

Evers also gave revised dates for the Special Election (Executive Order #46) for the 7th Congressional District 1. The date for the Special Election Primary will be the same as the State Primary, February 18th, 2020. The Special Election date will be May 12th, 2020.

The 7th Congressional District Seat is open due to the resignation of Republican, Sean Duffy on September 23rd, 2019, for family reasons.


